1) A Resolution to Expand the Afghan Army

- 1. WHEREAS, The US withdrawal from Afghanistan has led to fears that the
- 2. Taliban will regain dominance in the country; and

- 11. incorporate the National Front of Afghanistan into the Afghan armed forces.

2) The Compassionate Justice Act of 2016

- 7. SECTION 4. This law will take effect immediately upon passage.
- 8. SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null
- 9. and void.

4) A BILL TO REPEAL THE JONES ACT

BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

- 1. SECTION 1. The Merchant Marine Act of 1920 (P.L. 66-261), or the Jones Act,
- 2. is hereby repealed.
- 3. SECTION 3. The Departments of Defense and Commerce shall oversee the
- 4. execution of this legislation.
- 5. SECTION 4. This law shall take effect on January 1, 2015.
- 6. SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

- 6. SECTION 4. This law will take effect on January 1, 2016.
- 7. SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null
- 8. and void.

6) A Resolution to Change the Second Amendment to the Constitution of the United States

- 1. Whereas, the Executive Branch does not have the power to deny a person their
- **2.** 2^{nd} amendment right,
- 3. Whereas, the US government does not have the right to restrict the sale of
- 4. conventional firearms to civilians unless they create a explosion (i.e. grenades,
- 5. RPG's and grenade launchers),
- 6. Whereas, extensive back ground checks shall be required before the sale of any
- 7. firearm,
- 8. Whereas, a doctor can restrict issuance of a permit of a firearm based on the
- 9. person's mental state,
- 10. Whereas, crimes such as murder, grand theft auto, terrorism, armed robbery, and

11. espionage shall result in the restriction and/or prevention of the right to bear arms,

12. Whereas, a permit will be required for the possession of fully automatic weapons

13. and this permit can be revoked at any time if the Justice Department so desires,

14. Whereas, the Justice Department, CIA, and FBI shall have the power to enforce15. this law,

16. Whereas, the punishment for violation of the law shall result in a minimum of 2

17. years of incarceration and 150 hours of community service,

18. Whereas, the funds needed to pay for this resolution shall be taken from the

19. affordable care act, this amount shall be 50 million dollars, and taxes shall not be

20. raised to pay for this resolution,

21. Whereas, all laws conflicting with this resolution shall herby be rendered null22. and void,

23. Resolved, That the Congress here assembled makes this amendment to the

24. Second Amendment to the Constitution of the United States.

7) A Bill to Establish a 21st Century Civilian Conservation Corps Act BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

- 10. of this bill. The funding for this program will be determined after the bills passage
- 11. by the U.S. House Committee on Natural Works and the U.S. Senate Committee
- **12.** on Environment and Public Works.
- 13. SECTION 4. The law will take effect on January 1, 2016.
- 14. SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null15. and void.

- 5. closed circuit, as used in security systems.
- 6. SECTION 3: The Department of Justice shall oversee this legislation.
- 7. SECTION 4: If any officer tampers with or removes the security camera, or is
- 8. non-compliant of this bill, the officer involved shall receive a fine of \$2,000. In a
- 9. subsequent offense, the officer shall be removed from their position.

10. SECTION 5: This bill shall take effect 30 days from the date of passage.

10) A Resolution Regarding America's Prison Systems

- 2. significantly increased in the United States, and

- 6. SECTION 8. The Department of Justice shall enforce this legislation.
- 7. SECTION 9. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null
- 8. and void.

12) Posttraumatic Stress Disorder Act of 2014

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

- 1. SECTION 1. Effective programs will be developed to help combat the onset of
- 2. Posttraumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) in members of the armed forces during and
- 3. after active service.
- 4. SECTION 2. The Department of Defense will oversee the reallocation of
- 5. funding within its budget to support the development of said programs.
- 6. SECTION 3. Subcommittees of the Senate and House committees on Armed
- 7. Services will be created to review the effectiveness of implemented programs and
- 8. call for the change or redevelopment of programs that prove to be ineffective.
- 9. SECTION 4. The Department of Defense Congress will enforce this legislation,
- 10. and Congress will determine compliance with this bill.

11. SECTION 5. This law shall take effect ninety days after its passage.

12. SECTION 6. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null

13. and void.
