1) A Bill to End the Excessive Militarization of Local Police BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

- 1. SECTION 1. All federal programs and grants that assist local police in obtaining automatic
- 2. or semi-automatic weapons or APCs shall hereby be prevented from doing so; this bill will
- **3.** not apply to local SWAT teams.
- 4. SECTION 2. Federal programs and grants that assist local police in obtaining automatic or
- 5. semi-automatic weapons or APCs include but are not limited to the 1033 program and the
- **6.** Department of Justice's Byrne JAG Program.
- 7. APCs are defined as Armored Personal Carriers.
- 8. SWAT teams shall be defined as a group of elite police marksmen who specialize in high risk
- **9.** tasks.
- 10. Local police forces shall be defined as municipal, county, tribal, and regional police forces
- 11. that derive authority from the local governing body that created them.
- 12. SECTION 3. The Department of Justice, the Department of Defense, and the Department of
- 13. Homeland Security shall collaborate in implementing, enforcing, and abiding by this
- **14.** legislation.
- 15. Federal agencies that do not comply with this legislation shall lose 50% of their federal
- **16.** funding.
- **17. SECTION 4.** This legislation shall take effect on January 1, 2017
- **18. SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

2) A Bill to Provide Aid to Ukraine

BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

- 1. SECTION 1: The United States government shall hereby provide one billion dollars annually
- 2. To Ukraine for a period of three years. The United States shall also have the power to provide
- 3. Lethal aid.
- **4. SECTION 2:** Military support includes the direct provision of military equipment from the
- 5. United States or military equipment purchased from private entities. Lethal aid shall be
- **6.** Defined as any form of assistance not listed in Title 10, Section 2547 of United States code.
- **7. SECTION 3A:** The Department of Defense and the Department of State shall oversee this
- **8.** Bill.
- 9. SECTION 3B: The Department of State shall request that members of the North Atlantic
- 10. Treaty Organization shall also support the Ukrainian government in its conflict with
- 11. Pro-Russian rebels.
- **12. SECTION 4:** This legislation will be implemented immediately upon passage.
- 13. SECTION 5: All laws in conflict with this bill are hereby declared null and void.

3) Withdraw from the North Atlantic Treaty Organization

- 1. WHEREAS, The treaty obligates us to defend the borders of twenty-seven (27) other
- 2. North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) members under Article 5 without
- 3. constitutionally required congressional authorization; and
- 4. WHEREAS, We have over 60,000 military personnel stationed in NATO countries; and
- 5. WHEREAS, We shoulder over seventy percent of NATO's financial burden; and
- **6.** WHEREAS, The United States' best partners for international peace are now Russia,

- 7. China and Iran; now, therefore, be it
- **8. RESOLVED,** That the Student Congress here assembled invoke Article 13 and begin the
- **9.** one-year withdrawal process from NATO.

4) A Bill to Declare War on ISIL

- 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2. SECTION 1. The United States of America shall declare war on the organization referring to
- **3.** itself as the Islamic State of Iraq and the Levant (ISIL).
- 4. SECTION 2. This declaration of war authorizes the President of the United States, in his role as
- 5. Commander in Chief of United States military forces, to engage in offensive and
- **6.** defensive military operations against ISIL.
- 7. SECTION 3. Pursuant to this declaration of war this Congress shall provide funding necessary to
- 8. carry out missions against ISIL. Funding for the war against ISIL shall be reviewed
- **9.** each year by this Congress.
- **10. SECTION 4.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

- **4.** WHEREAS, States have not used revenue from lottery games responsibly
- **5.** And lottery money does not really benefit education;
- **6. RESOLVED,** That the United States Congress look for ways to ban state-run lotteries.

6) A Resolution to Amend the Constitution to Ban Capital Punishment

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

- 1. RESOLVED, That upon approval of two-thirds of the chamber of this Student
- 2. Congress here assembled, the following Constitutional amendment be sent to the state
- **3.** legislatures for approval:
- **4. SECTION 1:** The death penalty shall not be imposed by the United States,
- **5.** or by any State, Territory, or other jurisdiction within the United States.
- **6. SECTION 2:** The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by
- 7. appropriate legislation subject to approval of 3/4 of the states.

7) A Bill to Ban Solitary Confinement

- 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED
- 2. Section 1: Solitary confinement shall be banned in all state, federal, and privately owned
- **3.** prisons.
- 4. Section 2: Solitary confinement shall be defined as the practice of isolating a prisoner in
- **5.** a closed cell for 20-24 hours a day.
- **6.** Section 3: Disciplinary segregation may not occur for a period of longer than one week
- 7. and may only be used to prevent violence from occurring.
- 8. Section 4: Administrative segregation and involuntary protective custody shall hereby be
- **9.** entirely banned.
- **10. Section 5:** Supermax prisons shall hereby be banned.
- 11. Section 6a: All prisons currently designated as supermax prisons shall be required to

- 12. submit a plan to be approved by the Federal Bureau of Prisons concerning future
- 13. placement of prisoners by January 1, 2017. These plans shall begin to be implemented by
- **14.** January 1, 2018, and must be fully implemented by January 1, 2020.
- 15. Section 6b: All prisons currently holding prisoners in solitary confinement shall be
- 16. required to submit a plan to be approved by the Federal Bureau of Prisons concerning the
- 17. placement and treatment of all prisoners concerned no less than six months from the
- 18. passage of this bill. These plans shall begin to be implemented by January 1, 2017, and
- 19. must be fully implemented by January 1, 2018.
- **20. Section 7:** This bill shall be enforced by the Federal Bureau of Prisons.
- **21. Section 8:** All laws in conflict with this bill are hereby declared null and void.

8) A Resolution to Enforce Taxation on Churches

- 1. WHEREAS, Churches that file as religious organizations are exempted from all
- 2. taxes; and WHEREAS, Churchs own \$300-\$500 billion in untaxed property that
- 3. costs state and federal governments millions each; and
- 4. WHEREAS, The Constitution sets a clear precedent for separation of church and
- 5. state and no guidelines for what qualifies as a religion; now, therefore, be it
- **6. RESOLVED,** By the Congress assembled here that all churches and "religious
- 7. organizations" shall be taxed according to the property that they own.

9) A Bill to Cut Aid to Israel

- **3. A:** Israel withdraws its forces from the West Bank;
- **4. B:** Palestinian political prisoners are released;
- 5. C: The West Bank barrier has been demolished;
- **6. D:** Military operations against Palestinians cease for a period of three years.
- 7. **E:** The Gaza blockade is lifted;
- **8. F:** The Israeli settlements in the West Bank are vacated.
- 9. G: Construction projects on new settlements in the West Bank are ended; and
- 10. H: Israel recognizes the Palestinian nation, as set forth by the United Nations, as a
- 11. Sovereign state.
- 12. SECTION 2: The Department of State and the Department of Defense shall oversee
- 13. This bill.
- **14. SECTION 3:** This bill shall go into effect on January 1, 2017.
- **15. SECTION 4:** All laws in conflict with this bill are hereby declared null and void.

10) A BILL TO BAN PRIVATE PRISONS

- 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
- 2. SECTION 1. Private prisons are hereby banned. The privatization of prisons by both the
- 3. takeover of existing public facilities as well as the building and operation
- **4.** of new and additional prisons by for-profit companies is also banned.
- 5. SECTION 2. Private prisons, also known as for-profit prisons, are defined as places in
- **6.** which individuals are physically confined or incarcerated by a third party
- 7. that is contracted by a government agency.
- **8. SECTION 3.** The Federal Bureau of Prisons will oversee the enforcement of the bill.
- **9. SECTION 4**. This legislation will go into effect immediately.
- **10. SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

- 1. WHEREAS, Energy demand in the United States has been steadily escalating 10% in the
- 2. last ten years; and
- 3. WHEREAS, The amount of available customers in the United States increased from
- 4. approximately 133 million to 145 million from 2002-2012; and
- **5.** WHEREAS, The average retail price of energy has been inflated 37.7% in the last ten years
- **6.** which has ultimately hindered the economic recovery of the United States; and
- 7. WHEREAS, Wind energy is predicted to be the most promising source of renewable energy,
- **8.** increasing in production 37.3% since 2012, keeping pace in growth with natural gas
- **9.** production; and
- 10. WHEREAS, Wind energy research is required to continue this promising growth and will
- 11. create more opportunities for the American people in the form of research positions and
- 12. maintenance jobs on wind farms; now, therefore, be it
- 13. RESOLVED, By the Congress assembled here that wind energy research be supported by
- 14. the United States Government in the form of subsidized tax deductions for companies that
- 15. donate to any United States operated research sites pertaining to wind energy, or to
- **16.** companies that actively pursue renewable energy wind technology research.

13) A Resolution to Provide Further Aid to Syrian Refugees

- 1. Whereas, The Syrian refugee crises is the largest refugee crisis since World War II;
- 2. Whereas, The United States has largely sat back and done little while many other
- 3. Nations have accepted hundreds of thousands of refugees; and
- **4.** Whereas, The United States has largely accelerated the current conflict in the Middle
- 5. East and thus has a moral obligation to provide aid; now, therefore, be it
- **6. Resolved,** By the Student Congress here assembled that the United States accept
- 7. 500,000 refugees within six months, and they shall be allocated to the United States
- **8.** Minor Outlying Islands; and be it
- **9. FURTHER RESOLVED,** That after a period of three years living on the islands, the
- **10.** Refugees shall have the option to vote for statehood, independence, or remaining a
- 11. U.S. territory.

14) The Compassionate Access, Research Expansion, and Respect States Act

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

- 1. **SECTION 1**. The United States government allows states to set their own medical
- 2. marijuana policies.
- 3. SECTION 2. The government reclassify marijuana as a Schedule 2 drug in the Drug
- **4.** Enforcement Agency's five category drug classification system.
- 5. SECTION 3. The U.S. removes the CBD strains, used to treat epilepsy and seizure
- **6.** disorders, from the federal definition of marijuana.
- 7. **SECTION 4.** The federal government allows doctors working for the Department of
- 8. Veterans Affairs in states where medical marijuana is legal to recommend it for certain

- 9. condition.
- 10. SECTION 5. The government permit financial services and banking for marijuana
- 11. dispensaries.
- 12. SECTION 6. Public or private research that sanctioned by the government should be
- 13. exempted from federal criminal laws concerning the use or possession of marijuana.
- **14. SECTION 7.** The Drug Enforcement Agency will oversee the implementation of this bill.
- **15. SECTION 8.** This law will go into effect on January 1, 2017.
- **16. SECTION 9.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

16) The Fair Wage Act of 2017

- 4. **SECTION 2:** "Federal minimum wage" shall be defined as the lowest hourly wage that can
- **5.** Be provided to an individual as compensation for employment.
- **6. SECTION 3A:** The United States Department of Labor shall oversee this bill.
- 7. SECTION 3B: Upon passage, the Department of Labor shall create a list of any and all
- **8.** Potential exemptions from raises in the minimum wage.
- 9. SECTION 3C: After the five year period has elapsed, the minimum wage shall be evaluated
- 10. Once every year. If significant inflation has occurred, the wage will increase. If significant
- 11. Deflation occurs, the wage will be adjusted accordingly.
- **12. SECTION 4:** This bill shall go into effect January 1st, 2017.
- **13. SECTION 5:** Any and all laws in conflict with this bill are hereby declared null and void.
